## **EOC IS ABOUT PEOPLE**



EOC of Suffolk, Inc. (EOC) is on the front-lines fighting recidivism and Freddy Frederick's story is a perfect example. After a five-year incarceration, Freddy met EOC SNUG Program Street Outreach Worker Chris Parris at the Wyandanch Resource Center. Chris introduced Freddy to a myriad of community resources, positive activities, and networking

events that have helped Freddy to regain his self-confidence. As a result, Freddy enrolled and successfully graduated from a construction worker apprenticeship training program and is now working on repairs to the Brooklyn Bridge.

Like most young families in Suffolk County, Amy and Jonathan Keyes needed two incomes to make ends meet while grappling with the decision to place their young daughters in child care. The decision was made much easier once their girls started attending



EOC's East Patchogue child care center, now called, Way to Grow. "The staff is incredible," wrote Amy Keyes in a letter. "The loving and peaceful presence is remarkable. I sing your praises to all who ask for a child care recommendation."



Valentia came to the U.S. from Africa and faced domestic abuse after the birth of her son. Fearing for their safety, she fled, but was left homeless and without the legal documentation needed to receive benefits. EOC Care Coordinator Luisa Naranjo was instrumental in securing temporary housing at a family shelter. Determined to

help her gain self-sufficiency, EOC connected Valentia with Touro Law Center's Immigration Clinic which obtained legal status for her. She then received transportation and healthcare services as well as permanent housing. Valentia now works with EOC Care Coordinator Jenny Hago to achieve her medical, social, and vocational goals.

Janine Guercio credits EOC's Leaders of the Future program with providing her with a framework for future success. "EOC offered me information. skills, and opportunities that would otherwise be hard for me to find," Janine told us. "When I was struggling early on, EOC offered support with academic help, group discussions, and a sense of community that helped me feel like I could accomplish anything, and helped me to understand that I was




not alone. The network of people at EOC helped me get to where I am today: a successful ambitious college student at Nassau Community College and at Hofstra University."

Soon after, his wife, Dianne, was diagnosed with cancer and died, leaving Roy and his teenage son grieving and in debt from the medical expenses. Eviction soon followed and Roy's son went to live with family while he slept in his car. EOC's SSVF Case Manager Esther Rock helped provide the emotional

support Roy needed to move on without Dianne, and Housing Counselor Deanna Lamberti helped secure permanent housing. With renewed confidence and vigor, Roy has returned to his musical roots and is now touring with a band, earning a living, and regaining his independence.

## 2015 AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS

- Description ECC of Suffolk, Inc. launched a collaboration with Suffolk County on a pilot Community Based Initiative in Brentwood, Central Islip, and Bellport. Under this project, EOC will work to increase awareness of community-based services and opportunities for involvement through community events and outreach, proactively engaging the most vulnerable residents who can benefit most from services.
- ⇒ Partnering with Stony Brook Medicine, EOC of Suffolk, Inc. launched an innovative approach to healthcare delivery developed by the New York State Department of Health called the **Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment** (DSRIP) program. DSRIP promotes community-level collaborations, including outreach and assessment, with a focus on system reform.
- ⇒ EOC of Suffolk, Inc. again hosted the **15th Annual Butch Dellecave Awards** breakfast and ceremony. Named in memory of the legendary educator, official, and coach Gaetano "Butch" Dellecave, the award is a partnership with local schools, the Butch Dellecave Foundation, and Newsday. Students are honored for their athletic, academic, and community-based achievements.
- Our staff prepared to transition EOC of Suffolk, Inc.'s East Patchogue child care center from a Tutor Time franchise to the independent **Way to Grow**. This new model will provide the flexibility needed to better prepare students for kindergarten and the state's Common Core curriculum as well as to invest more resources into the school.
